

School Uniforms

Hats

Students are required to wear a grey or black bucket hat outside.

Girls Uniform

Black cargo or track pants can be worn as well as black tights however tights must be worn under the school uniform.




Lost Property

Introducing the RAMSR Program at THS Preschool

Tweed Heads South Preschool is proud to introduce the Rhythm and Movement for Self-Regulation (RAMSR) program, delivered by our Student Support Officer, Amy Matson. This exciting, evidence-based program supports young children in developing the self-regulation skills they need for a confident start to school.

Developed by Associate Professor Kate Williams at the Queensland University of Technology, RAMSR uses fun, music-based activities to build children's executive functioning skills—such as attention control, emotional regulation, flexible thinking, and working memory.

Each session is filled with playful, rhythmic games like start/stop activities, instruction reversals, and memory challenges, helping children learn how to pause, focus, and follow directions—all while having fun through movement and music.

By embedding RAMSR into the weekly routine, we're helping children grow their social-emotional resilience and laying the groundwork for a successful transition to formal schooling.

Our last week of Term 1 was filled with the joy and excitement of Easter! The children engaged in a variety of Easter-themed experiences that sparked creativity, imagination, and collaboration.

Using cotton buds and pastel paints, the children delicately decorated bunnies, focusing on fine motor control and self-expression, showcasing the children's developing artistic skills.
